This hike presents several challenges: finding the route requires very close obsenvation; the bushwhack down a wild ridge is unnerving; and there is enough Poison Oak to keep you scratching for a week. But Blue Gorge is such a surprise that it could be worth it. The best time for this outing is in the spring, or after a good rain.

This is a loop trip starting at Mulholland Drive just 3.6 miles from the San Diego Freeway overpass. Park along Mulholland somewhere between Fireroad 26 - the start of the hike - and Fireroad 27A - the end of the hike.

Walk around the fireroad gate, at Fireroad 26, south onto Sullivan Ridge west. After 25 minutes of walking, look for a pipeline marker on the right. You will get a good view of the ocean from here. Most of the hike to this point has been on the ridge; the road goes on the east side of a small peak, then around on the west side of the next small peak. Look for the pipeline sign and a ridge dropping down to the west. Follow down the ridge to the west through Deerweed, Buckwheat, and Laurel Sumac. In ten minutes - about a third of the way to the canyon - there is another pipeline sign; the ridge turns $45^{\circ}$ left at this point and the route becomes steeper as you go through a plant area of Lupines and Brown Sugar plant. In six or seven minutes the route comes to the end of the clear area and levels off a bit. Turn right and contour north along what could almost be called a trail for seven or eight minutes until reaching some old high chaparral, mostly Sumac, that west until locked gate on $L T$ : Has" 26 " in blade I trs on vertical post, "Sullivan" in white ltrs on horiz member of gate mile 4.1. Contince on west to wide parking area on $R T$-park mile 4.3. Walk bade (East) to FR:Z6gate.
